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Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Laureate Park ES serves 1160 students enrolled in grades Kindergarten through fifth. The student population's ethnicity is 42% Hispanic and 58% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 73% White, 7% Black, 0% Native, 12% Asian, 1% Pacific, and 7% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Suzanne Workum and Assistant Principal Kathy Ramsey. Laureate Park ES is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Recycling Club, Arts and Drama Club, Gifted Program, Safety Patrol, Chess Club, NEWS Crew and Sunshine State Young Readers Award program.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Laureate Park ES indicates that the average age of the collection is 2014 and the number of books per student is 10. The [American Association for School Libraries](#) has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection.

At this time, Laureate Park ES does not meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Based on the reading scores, more books should be purchased on *lower/higher* reading levels.
- Assessments have changed from last year to this year.
- In addition to the physical media center collection, the district provides 2,437 titles for our students.
- This collection contains many of the titles suggested by the DOE list and the new B.E.S.T. Standards suggested readings.
- The average publication date of 2014 is acceptable but needs to be improved.
- Even though I focused on Hispanic and Asian books last year, I still need to focus on those areas.
- I also need to focus on newer versions of technology/computer books.

Comparison between 2021-22 and 2022-23 Testing Data

In 2023, the state transitioned from Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) to Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and previous years' data. The implementation of FAST K-2 in the 2022-23 school year was the first administration of statewide assessments for students in grades K-2. These assessments include Star Early Literacy Proficiency, Star Reading Proficiency, and Star Math Proficiency.

Collection Analysis by Category

The information collected in this section provides a detailed look at the current library collection by classification and genre. The information was gathered from Follett Destiny, the library management system, and Titlewave, the vendor's ordering and analysis tool.
